Multimethod Research in Political Science

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The course introduces participants to the central idea underlying multimethod research (MMR) and principles and challenges in implementing it. In this course, multimethod research is understood as the combination of a large-n or medium-n method, usually a statistical method or QCA, with process tracing. We start the course by working out the rationale of MMR and the conditions under which it is more and less sensible to do. Furthermore, we position multimethod research in the broader framework of mixed-method research that is more common in education and parts of sociology.

In the second part of the workshop, we address three particular challenges in MMR. These include concept formation and operationalization, case selection for process tracing and generalization. We finish the workshop with a short list of best practices in multimethod research.
